Dean Samuel Reynolds Hole celebrations



At the end of August there was a special exhibition celebrating the 200th anniversary of the birth of Dean Reynolds Hole who not only was Dean of Rochester until his death in 1904, but was a founder member of the National Rose Society.

Rochester was then a busy industrial city with cement works along the River Medway and a naval dockyard at Chatham. The acrid smell of lime was inescapable and so work soon began on a new garden to 'perfume the air'.

His gardening friends admired and advised - most notably William Robinson, Gertrude Jekyll, William Paul, Canons Ellacombe and D'Ombrain.

The gardens at Rochester became famous and were painted by the noted English watercolourists, George Samuel Elgood and Arthur Rowe. The Dean of Rochester was on a mission!

At the age of 75 Reynolds Hole toured America in an attempt to raise money for the Cathedral. Received enthusiastically,

he was the guest of many horticulturists and botanists who knew of his fame.

Although disappointed that he had only raised £500, this money was nonetheless essential in urgent restoration work and, in particular, rebuilding of the spire. Sadly, Reynolds Hole did not live to see the spire completed and died aged 85 in the Deanery on 27th August 1904.

To celebrate this inspiring man a series of special events were held commencing with an evening in the cathedral where horticulturalist Marian Boswall very kindly gave a talk, guests were able to sample a special Dean Hole ale that had been produced by Nelson Brewery and listen to a very special piece of music composed by Philip Dodd.

Spotlight on Graffiti

At recent Garden Parties hosted by the Dean, The Very Reverend Dr Philip Hesketh at The Deanery, some exclusive tours were undertaken by the Chapter Clerk/Executive Officer Simon Lace, and Cathedral Researcher Jacob Scott, who has a vast amount of self taught knowledge of the Cathedral and particularly the ancient graffiti.

From Dean Hole's endeavours in 1895 until today, fundraising hasn't stopped. Recently completed is the work to the Pinnacle on the Cathedral roof that was so unstable it was very close to collapsing. Thankfully this project is now complete and a new Pinnacle erected.

The next project

Our new priority is to tackle the three most urgent issues identified in the Quin Quennial survey. All have health and safety implications as they involved unstable masonry at height. The first of these, the Southern Presbytery Elevation and Pinnacle is currently being dealt with. The next two concern repairs to the interior of the Quire and the ceiling and roof space above.

Repairing the loose masonry at the clerestory level in the Southern Quire is important as this is above an area of seating. Repairing the roof vault will enable the Quire ceiling to be repaired allowing the unsightly safety netting to be removed. We can tackle this issue now as the roof was repaired last summer and no longer leaks into the roof void. These total cost of both these projects is £175,000 excluding VAT.

Lighting and Sound

The 2018 Quinquennial Inspection highlighted the fact that the electrical installation within the majority of the Cathedral is of some age and has been amended and extended on many occasions. The Hidden Treasures Fresh Expressions project completed in the Crypt has replaced the electrical systems in this area of the Cathedral, but the rest of the Cathedral electrical systems have not been significantly upgraded in many years. In recent years, electrical mains have had to be replaced due to failure and in 2018 for the first time, probably for over a decade, an electrical inspection was undertaken of the electrical systems. This highlighted a number of repair issues which need to be addressed, but the system was not considered dangerous. However, at high level throughout the clerestories there are large numbers of redundant cables and fittings and tracing much of the installation has been very difficult.

In addition, the electrical, sound and vision systems within the body of the Cathedral are considered completely inadequate. Lighting levels are generally very poor with some fittings falling apart, the sound system needs to be upgraded and there is no sensible vision provision within the Cathedral. All these systems



are considered inadequate and are seriously affecting the presentation of the building, worship, liturgy and mission.

The Cathedral has resolved that all these systems need to be upgraded and/or replaced if we are to safeguard the fabric of the Cathedral and allow the presentation and mission of the Cathedral to move forward.

International Moving Image and Contemporary Art Festival

51zero Festival launches its 4th edition at Rochester Cathedral's crypt on Friday the 25th October, with an evening of film screenings accompanied by live music, curated by Margherita Gramegna. The evening will feature leading UK musicians Gareth Lockrane on flute, Cecilia Bignall on cello and Jonathan Mansfield on vibraphone responding to a film programme presenting artists and filmmakers whose production is between contemporary art and cinema, operating on a local and international level. Peter Fillingham's edible artwork The Rainbow Buns, will complete the evening.



The event is followed by an exhibition from Saturday 26th October to Sunday 3rd November, which will feature sculpture and moving image by prominent artists working today.

This year's programme will take place in both Rochester and Canterbury. Exhibitions, screenings, workshops and events will take place across Rochester Cathedral, Restoration House, the Guildhall Museum, Huguenot Museum and Rochester High Street. In Canterbury, it will populate the University for the Creative Arts campus including the Herbert Read Gallery.
