
Please do not take photographs, sound or video recordings during the service. As part of our safeguarding, no photography of children is permitted in the Cathedral.

ORDER OF SERVICE

An Introit may be sung by the choir

Stand as the choir and clergy enter

On Sundays the service begins with the **Introduction** and **Confession** On other days the service begins with the **Preces (Opening Responses)**

On Sundays Introduction Kneel or sit Confession All Almighty and most merciful Father; We have erred, and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; and we have done those things which we ought not to have done; and there is no health in us. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders. Spare thou them, O God, which confess their faults. Restore thou them that are penitent; according to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesu our Lord. And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake; that we may hereafter live a godly, righteous and sober life, to the glory of thy holy name. Amen. Absolution The Lord's Prayer Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy All

All Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, For ever and ever. Amen.

Old Testament Reading

Stand for Magnificat (The Song of Mary) sung by the choir

My soul doth magnify the Lord: and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour. For he hath regarded: the lowliness of his handmaiden. For behold, from henceforth: all generations shall call me blessed. For he that is mighty hath magnified me: and holy is his Name. And his mercy is on them that fear him: throughout all generations. He hath shewed strength with his arm: he hath scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts. He hath put down the mighty from their seat: and hath exalted the humble and meek. He hath filled the hungry with good things: and the rich he hath sent empty away. He remembering his mercy hath holpen his servant Israel: as he promised to our forefathers, Abraham and his seed, for ever.

New Testament Reading

Stand for Nunc Dimittis (The Song of Simeon) sung by the choir

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace: according to thy word. For mine eyes have seen: thy salvation, Which thou hast prepared: before the face of all people; To be a light to lighten the Gentiles: and to be the glory of thy people Israel.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son: and to the Holy Ghost; As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be: world without end. Amen.

Turn East to say The Apostles' Creed

All I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth: And in Jesus Christ his only Son our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Ghost, Born of the Virgin Mary, Suffered under Pontius Pilate, Was crucified, dead, and buried, He descended into hell; The third day he rose again from the dead, He ascended into heaven, And sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty; From thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead. I believe in the Holy Ghost; the holy Catholic Church; the Communion of Saints; the Forgiveness of sins; The Resurrection of the body; and the Life everlasting. Amen.

Lesser Litany, Lord's Prayer and Responses sung by the cantor and choir

Cantor The Lord be with you.

Choir And with thy spirit. Let us pray.

Kneel or sit as the **Responses** continue

Collects sung by the cantor and the choir

Anthem sung by the choir

Prayers concluding with

All The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all evermore. Amen.

On weekdays, the cantor and choir sing the **Dismissal Responses** (If a sermon is preached after the prayers an additional **hymn** is sung) On Saturdays, Sundays, and Festivals, a **hymn** is sung (during which a collection may be taken) and a **blessing** is given
