PARTICULARS OF MEMBERSHIP

THE Association of the Friends of Rochester Cathedral was formed in 1935, as it was felt that there were many who would like to be associated with this ancient and interesting church and to have a share in the preservation and upkeep of the fabric.

The Diocese and Cathedral of Rochester go back to the beginning of English Christianity. This is not to be confused with Christianity in what we now speak of as England, for Christianity flourished in Kent soon after the year A.D. 200, and although there is no proof of a Christian Church in Rochester in those early days, there is at least a likelihood that there was one. The Mission sent by Pope Gregory the Great, and welcomed and aided by King Ethelbert, secured the founding of the See of Canterbury about A.D. 597, and those of Rochester and London in A.D. 604. Close to the West Door of the Cathedral the foundations of the apse of the old Saxon Church were discovered—semicircular lines just inside the Cathedral mark the site—and the foundations of its Nave walls were traced running westwards across the cemetery outside. No foundations of a western apse have been discovered. The Cathedral Church as it stands to-day is an interesting epitome of English architecture from early Norman to the present century—the latter represented by restoration work.

All who care for this venerable church are therefore asked to join the Association of Friends of Rochester

Cathedral, and thus to help the Dean and Chapter to bear the responsibility of preserving for future generations a building which stands for so much in the history of our National Church.

Since the inauguration over 2,000 Friends have enrolled themselves, and their contributions have resulted in much valuable work in several ways. Important and necessary repairs to the fabric have been carried out, especially to parapets, roofs, and copings. During the war, funds were supplied by the Friends for defence work against bomb damage, blast, and fire. But it is especially due to their efforts that there has been revealed the interest and beauty of the Monastic Cloisters, its buildings, and its garth. The Chapter House doorway has been opened and the exquisite Romanesque carving of its masonry shown. Within the Chapter House, Priors' burial places have been discovered; the foundations of the pillars which carried a gallery across the west end from the dormitory to the Cathedral have been exposed; the refectory doorway and its adjacent washing-trough have been made objects of interest; and the fine vaulted archway entered from the main road of the Precinct has been opened out. Of the Cellarer's buildings some walls have been shown, and the Tudor buttresses clearly tell what King Henry the Eighth planned for the housing of his retinue. Funds are urgently needed for all this work. Will you become a Friend and help?

The minimum subscription has been fixed at 5s. per annum, which it is hoped will enable all who wish to do so to enrol themselves, but it is also hoped that many will be able to give larger sums. There is also a Corporate Membership for Schools, Colleges, Parochial Church Councils, etc., with a minimum subscription of 10s. per annum, whilst Individual Life Membership is £10, or Joint Life Membership, for husband and wife, £15 15s. Boys and girls under 18 years of age, 2s. per annum. Each Friend receives a Card of Membership

and a copy of the Annual Report is sent to each Member other than Junior Members, when published. A form of application will be found at the end of this Report and should be sent to the Honorary Secretary, The Precinct, Rochester.

Friends who visit the Cathedral and attend Festivals are asked to wear the Badge of Membership, illustrated on the cover. It consists of a gold scallop on a red field with the words "Friends of Rochester Cathedral" round the rim and the date of the inception. Badges are 2s. od. (1s. 6d. for Junior Members) and may be obtained from the Honorary Secretary.

THE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

THE Diocese welcomed its Bishop, and the Friends of the Cathedral their President, at his Enthronement on 1st February, 1961. Friends, who were present in great numbers, were justly proud of their Cathedral that day. The new heating was in use, although the silencing of the fans was not yet completed. The change which attracted most attention was the cleaning of the west front. Last summer the whole front was encased in scaffolding, and a row of hoses began work on the stone with a gentle spray of pure water, softly washing each tiny section for about twenty-four hours, loosening and removing the grime of ages. Before the winter began the scaffolding was taken down and the whole west front glowed like gold in the sunshine as no one ever remembered seeing it before. Details of carving which were previously unnoticed, and the lovely colour of the stone, are now a joy to behold.

Some new photographs have been taken by the College of Art, and it is hoped to produce a good illustrated book on the Cathedral.

The organ has also been completed, towards which the Friends contributed over £700 in addition to anonymous gifts promised last year. The details of the additions are far too technical for most of us to understand, but the result is that the organ is now one of the finest, and worthy of our organist and choir. A series of special recitals will be given later in the year.

I am sure Friends will be glad to know how much the Cathedral is used. There are, of course, the regular celebrations of Holy Communion, Mattins and Evensong, sung or said; the King's School hold their daily service in the Quire. Many organisations and groups come to the Cathedral for special services: this year, in particular, there have been the Dedication of the new Girl Guide County Standard, the Licensed Victuallers' Service, and the Industrial Festival on 12th March, at which forty-three manufacturing firms in the Medway

Towns offered their products in the Cathedral (just as the corn and marrows are offered at harvest festivals); the procession of the representative parties from the firms numbered about two hundred and fifty people.

During Holy Week there was a Bible Exhibition to mark the 350th Anniversary of the Authorized Version and the publication of the New English Bible (the new Bible has been used in the Cathedral since the date of its publication); and on Maundy Thursday the Queen distributed her Maundy Money in the Cathedral. Thirty-five old men and thirty-five old women from all parts of the Diocese received their gifts from the Queen herself. The Cathedral was again crowded to capacity. The Queen was graciously pleased to make half the distribution in the Quire and half in the Nave, so that most people in the Cathedral were able to see something of the ceremony. One of the Lessons was read by the Duke of Edinburgh.

The number of summer visitors to the Cathedral tends to grow. Last summer the Company of Cathedral Welcomers came into existence. Over twenty men and one or two ladies volunteered to be on duty in the Cathedral for a morning or an afternoon, to welcome people, show them something of the Cathedral and try to let them know what a cathedral is for. Their work was appreciated, and I have had tributes from far and near.

We have lost by death some very fine old Friends: Canon and Mrs. McKean died within a few weeks of each other; Mr. F. C. Matthews, a member of the Council of Friends and a steward; Mr. Neech, an original member of Friends and a steward; and Dr. Irene Churchill, a Friend of very long standing and a member of the Council since 1937.

We were also sorry to say good-bye to Admiral Sir Robin Durnford-Slater on his retirement from the Nore Command.

We are grateful to all our Friends of the Cathedral and subscribers; and, may I add, to Miss Snowdon-Smith, who still does the collecting of boxes.

It is a privilege to work in a cathedral which is loved by such a loyal body of Friends—and I hope the circle will go on widening—where the music of the choir and special choir is so reverently produced, and where so many people care for the fabric and its beauty with flowers, needlework, brass-cleaning, and gifts too numerous to mention.

REPORT OF THE HON. SECRETARY AND TREASURER

MEMBERSHIP

THERE is a slight increase in membership of 12 over the past year, to give a total membership figure of 1,151 at the moment. We have, however, lost 62 members during the year (23 by death), but having enrolled 74 new members the slight increase mentioned above has taken place.

FINANCE

From the Statement of Accounts which is printed in this Report it will be observed that the financial position of the Association is satisfactory, and that the majority of the items under Income show an increase over last year's figures. It is satisfactory that more members are giving their subscriptions under covenant, although the sum reclaimed from the Income Tax authorities shows a decrease due to the rate of tax being reduced. Needless to say, we are most grateful to those members who do covenant to pay their subscription, and to many others who have sent donations.

The Council has authorized a sum not exceeding £120 to pay for the extension of the amplifying system to the Transepts (which was installed temporarily for the Royal Maundy), and to pay for the installation of a light near the steps giving access to the south door,

part of which expenditure is provided by a gift of £15 which the late Miss Harling wished to make, and which has been honoured.

CHRISTMAS CARDS

The 1960 cards proved rather more popular than those of the previous year, and a few still remain which will now be sold at 6s. a dozen. The Council have under review the issue of a card for this year, and members will, of course, be notified when they are ready for sale.

GENERAL

Again we record our thanks to Mr. H. J. Hoby, who has once more audited the Association's accounts on behalf of his firm, Messrs. Tribe, Clarke, Darton and Pollock.

The Ladies' Guild continues to staff the bookstall during the summer months, with the satisfactory result that the amount from the sales of post cards shows an increase. We are most grateful to them for their help.

PERSONAL

As many of the members will know, I myself at present hold down the posts of Sacrist and Succentor in the Cathedral, and I suffer from war disabilities. The result is that I have to lean very heavily on Mr. H. G. Cooper, whose loyal and regular service in the office cannot be over-praised, particularly as he has not been too well during the winter.

I should also be very wrong if I did not mention Miss B. Neech, who gives up many an evening, and often her lunch hour, for she holds a full-time post by day, and can always be relied upon to keep the office going during Mr. Cooper's absence.

I am sure that all members, as well as myself, ought to be very grateful to them.

THE ENTHRONEMENT OF
RICHARD DAVID SAY
AS 104TH BISHOP OF ROCHESTER

ON 1st of February, 1961, a tall man clad in cope and mitre knocked three times with his staff on the great west door of the Cathedral. The doors were opened and he received a challenge from the Dean: "Who comes—in the name of the Lord?" His reply was that he was David, elected, confirmed and consecrated 104th Bishop of Rochester, and asked entrance to the Cathedral Church.

Thus began one of the most impressive services witnessed in the building for many years.

The congregation of about 2,500 people watched him advance slowly to the Quire screen and heard a soft, warm voice say: "Do justly—love mercy—walk humbly with thy God. . . ."

The oath having been administered and taken, the Bishop was welcomed by the congregation and the trumpets sounded a fanfare. After the reading of the Lesson, the Bishop's procession moved towards the throne.

The moment of enthronement had arrived. This ceremony was performed by the Archdeacon of Canterbury and was followed by a short period of silence. The choir then sang an anthem, the words of which were taken from Psalm 141. This finished, the Dean said in a triumphant voice:

"Thanks be to God for the Holy Catholic Church.

Thanks be to God for the Church of England.

Thanks be to God for Geoffrey, Archbishop of this Province.

Thanks be to God for David, Bishop of Rochester."

Then the trumpets and organ sounded a two-and-a-half-minute fanfare founded on "All people that on earth do dwell", the congregation joining in singing the Doxology.

Report on the work carried out in 1960 and proposed as soon as funds permit

A PART from minor repairs, the important work carried out to the fabric of the Cathedral in 1960 has been the washing (and incidental repair) of the west front. This, as is now generally recognized, was recommended as much for the good of the structure as for reasons of appearance, but the benefit, of course, which is felt is the marked improvement in the beauty of this front.

It can now be appreciated as an architectural design, and the carving of the superb west doorway has emerged from the mask of encrusted dirt which has for so long concealed it.

In addition to the repair work which has been done, a new heating system has been installed. It consists of five oil-fired heaters, all except one of which have been housed out of sight. There seems to be no doubt that

this system will prove very effective when compared with the old stoves, but it has in this season suffered considerably from what one hopes may be only teething troubles.

The two main works of repair to be carried out as soon as funds are available are:

(a) The repair to the stonework of the tower, where buried tie-rods must be prevented from continuing the damage which they are inflicting by rust expansion on the stones.

(b) The repair and pointing of the Chapter Room wall and similar work, and washing of the eastern arm of the Cathedral. It is proposed to start with the east wall of the Presbytery and work methodically westwards on the north side in this and succeeding years.
