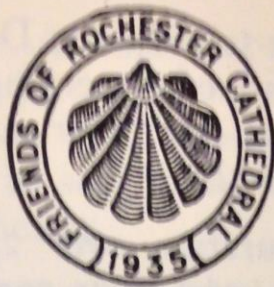

PARTICULARS OF MEMBERSHIP

THE Association of the Friends of Rochester Cathedral was formed in 1935, as it was felt that there were many who would like to be associated with this ancient and interesting church and to have a share in the preservation and upkeep of the fabric.

The Diocese and Cathedral of Rochester go back to the beginning of English Christianity. This is not to be confused with Christianity in what we now speak of as England, for Christianity flourished in Kent soon after the year A.D. 200, and although there is no proof of a Christian Church in Rochester in those early days, there is at least a likelihood that there was one. The Mission sent by Pope Gregory the Great, and welcomed and aided by King Ethelbert, secured the founding of the See of Canterbury about A.D. 597, and those of Rochester and London in A.D. 604. Close to the West Door of the Cathedral the foundations of the apse of the old Saxon Church were discovered—semicircular lines just inside the Cathedral mark the site—and the foundations of its Nave walls were traced running westwards across the cemetery outside. No foundations of a western apse have been discovered. The Cathedral Church as it stands to-day is an interesting epitome of English architecture from early Norman to the present century—the latter represented by restoration work.

All who care for this venerable church are therefore asked to join the Association of Friends of Rochester

Cathedral, and thus to help the Dean and Chapter to bear the responsibility of preserving for future generations a building which stands for so much in the history of our National Church.

Since the inauguration over 2,000 Friends have enrolled themselves, and their contributions have resulted in much valuable work in several ways. Important and necessary repairs to the fabric have been carried out, especially to parapets, roofs, and copings. During the war, funds were supplied by the Friends for defence work against bomb damage, blast, and fire. But it is especially due to their efforts that there has been revealed the interest and beauty of the Monastic Cloisters, its buildings, and its garth. The Chapter House doorway has been opened and the exquisite Romanesque carving of its masonry shown. Within the Chapter House, Priors' burial places have been discovered; the foundations of the pillars which carried a gallery across the west end from the dormitory to the Cathedral have been exposed; the refectory doorway and its adjacent washing-trough have been made objects of interest; and the fine vaulted archway entered from the main road of the Precinct has been opened out. Of the Cellarer's buildings some walls have been shown, and the Tudor buttresses clearly tell what King Henry the Eighth planned for the housing of his retinue. Funds are urgently needed for all this work. Will you become a Friend and help?

The minimum subscription has been fixed at 5s. per annum, which it is hoped will enable all who wish to do so to enrol themselves, but it is also hoped that many will be able to give larger sums. There is also a Corporate Membership for Schools, Colleges, Parochial Church Councils, etc., with a minimum subscription of 10s. per annum, whilst Individual Life Membership is £10, or Joint Life Membership, for husband and wife, £15 15s. Boys and girls under 18 years of age, 2s. per annum. Each Friend receives a Card of Membership

and a copy of the Annual Report is sent to each Member other than Junior Members, when published. A form of application will be found at the end of this Report and should be sent to the Honorary Secretary, The Precinct, Rochester.

Friends who visit the Cathedral and attend Festivals are asked to wear the Badge of Membership, illustrated on the cover. It consists of a gold scallop on a red field with the words "Friends of Rochester Cathedral" round the rim and the date of the inception. Badges are 2s. od. (1s. 6d. for Junior Members) and may be obtained from the Honorary Secretary.

THE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

WORK OF THE FRIENDS

ONE after another they come, visitors from all over the country and the world, making their way to Rochester Cathedral. Almost all of them stop at a Table in the South Transept where the Authorized Version and New English Bible, open at the Lessons for the day, invite the visitor to stop and read—which he usually does. The Table is the gift of the Friends, beautifully and strongly fashioned by Kentish Church Builders.

In the North Aisle are two other new Tables, also given by the Friends, on which Guide Books and literature can be well laid out. And in St. Peter's Chapel they have given yet another Table, date about 1620. On it is set up a Map of the Dioceses of the Anglican Communion, on which we hope to mark where about one hundred missionaries from this Diocese are serving. On a faldstool in front of the Altar is the list of their names for whom prayer is asked.

The Friends have added extra amplification, and completed the loud-speaker system in the Presbytery and Transepts, so that there are no more dead spots. The additional cost of the former was met by donations in memory of the late Mr. Carl Wootton.

A light at the dark steps leading down to the South Entrance was made possible by Mrs. J. Harling's legacy, with a donation from Miss Snowdon-Smith.

The Friends have underwritten a new half-crown Illustrated Guide, produced by Pitkins, and written by Canon Pentreath.

We are very grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Lee, who put on Christopher Fry's "A Sleep of Prisoners" in the Nave for a week, leading up to the Friends' Festival on the last night. At this year's Festival Mr. Harwood will show a remarkable series of transparencies he has taken in the Cathedral, guaranteed to reveal things that none of us have appreciated before.

Five of the original members of the Friends have died during the year: Mr. W. P. Toone, the Rev. S. L. Butcher, Sir Charles Tuff, Mr. F. H. Cripps-Day, Mr. Carl Wootton; all of whom showed their devotion as Friends for over a quarter of a century.

Our President for twenty years, Bishop C. M. Chavasse, died on March 10th. We offer our gratitude to God for a great Bishop, and our sympathy to Mrs. Chavasse, his devoted wife, and to their family.

He was a true Friend of the Cathedral. He loved the building and its worship; and most Sundays he was there at the 8 o'clock Celebration.

A Memorial Service was held in the Cathedral on 24th March, at which the Archbishop of York spoke of his great work.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Now let me give some general news of Cathedral activities for the benefit of Friends who cannot often come to Rochester.

The Organists and Choirs continue to lead the music of worship. A Carol Service, with Tableaux and Commentary, was beautifully arranged, but almost impenetrable snow reduced the congregation to about two hundred. On 2nd August Evensong was broadcast by the B.B.C., and the Industrial Festival at 11 a.m. on 20th May will be televised. The Choral Society have given several concerts, not least St. Matthew Passion on 7th April. Mothers' Union Festival Services are being held on three consecutive days in May. Mr. Peter Kirk, M.P., preached at Mattins about New Delhi. Bishop Anthony Bloom of Sergievo preached in the evening about the Church in Russia, and the 150th anniversary of Charles Dickens' birth was marked by Readings given at the Sunday Evening Service by Mr. Clinton Baddeley. A different kind of anniversary is the 300th of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer on 3rd June, when we shall have an Exhibition of Prayer

Books. Perhaps the most striking innovation has been the huge cross erected in the middle of the Nave during Lent.

Finally, I must again say what a comfort it is to know that the Friends are always there to meet continual urgent needs; and with the Friends may I add all those many others who love and serve Rochester Cathedral.

A remark by a recent visitor: "This Cathedral gives one the feeling that it is loved."

REPORT OF THE HON. SECRETARY AND TREASURER

MEMBERSHIP

There is again a slight increase in membership of 12 over the past year, to give a total membership figure of 1,163 at the moment. We have, however, lost 31 members during the year (19 by death), but having enrolled new members the slight increase mentioned above has taken place.

We are sorry to have to report the death of Mr. Carl Wootton, a very keen member of the Council and a generous contributor to the Funds.

We are, however, glad to be able to welcome as new members of the Council: Mr. D. J. Bradley of Thos. Watson Ltd.; Mr. L. T. Waddams, Headmaster of the Mathematical School; Mr. K. A. Pollock, a partner in the firm of Tribe, Clarke, Darton & Pollock, Cathedral Auditors; and likewise, Mr. C. S. Hayes, the Principal of the Medway College of Art. We feel sure they will be a great help to us.

FINANCE

Once again the Association is in a good financial position, as will be seen from the audited Accounts. During the year the Council have authorized the payment of the extra amplification in the Quire, and the purchase of extending scaffolding, which has enabled the staff to clean the candelabra in the Nave, and they have defrayed the cost of permanent lighting for the Christmas Tree, and some Tables requested by the Dean, one—an antique—in the newly formed Missionary Chapel.

It would be a tremendous help, both to us and the members themselves, if more and more would pay their annual subscriptions by Banker's Order, or better still, under Covenant, thereby cutting out the re-

minders, which sometimes have to be sent three or four times!

We continue to be grateful to Mr. Hoby for once again auditing the Accounts, and to the Ladies' Guild and Welcomers for helping to increase our sale of postcards.

Mrs. Cooper has, as usual, looked to the cleaning of the office, which, this year, must be re-decorated. Her husband, whose loyal work in the office is an annual source of wonder, has been in very poor health this winter. We shall be very glad to have him back in full health. Meantime, Mr. G. Cook has kindly taken up some of his duties, and Miss Neech as usual has done yeoman's service.

IVY MURIEL TAIT

Since this report was prepared we have learned with great regret of Mrs. Tait's death on Good Friday. She was a very generous contributor for many years to the Cathedral, its furnishings, and flowers.

She will be very greatly missed by her friends in the Precinct, as well as throughout the Diocese.

THE MUSIC OF THE CATHEDRAL

FOR forty-four weeks of the year, the following pattern of choral services is being maintained:

On Sundays, Mattins, Holy Communion (except the first Sunday) and Evensong.

On weekdays (except Wednesday), Evensong daily; Holy Communion is sung on red-letter Saints' days and Mattins occasionally on certain other Holy days.

Thus it will be seen that, though we now have no Choir School, as full a complement of choral services is being maintained as in most provincial cathedrals. We are fortunate in our arrangements for lay-clerks and have a body of singers whose attainments are of the first quality.

Of the music sung, we try to include that which is representative of the best from all periods. Thus, chronologically speaking, we start with Plainsong, and include the traditional psalm tunes and some of the great Plainsong hymn tunes. From the early mediaeval period we include a thirteenth-century Gymel for two voices. The music of the great Tudor composers is very fully represented in the repertory and includes the best of Tallis, Tye, Byrd, Weelkes, Farrant, Tomkins, Morley and Gibbons, to mention only the greatest. All the three Byrd Masses are sung regularly and Gibbons' "O clap your hands" is also sung at Ascensiontide. Of the post-Tudors, two newly discovered motets by Martin Peerson are of unusual interest.

Of the four big names of the Restoration period, Purcell, Blow, Wise and Pelham Humphreys, all are represented, though not as fully as could be desired, since reliable editions of their work are generally unavailable. However, this deficiency is being remedied to some extent by the new performing editions of the Purcell Society, of which full use is being made. A notable venture was the performance of Purcell's verse anthem, "Behold, I bring you glad tidings", on Christmas Eve last with string orchestra. It is hoped

to make this an annual event.

The eighteenth century is still less well represented and for the same reason: lack of performing editions. Nevertheless, Boyce, Croft, Greene and Battishill are all represented, the first-named fairly fully.

Early Victorian church composers whose works are included are the two Wesleys, Attwood, Goss and Walmisley. The elder Wesley is represented by the motet, "Sing aloud with gladness", and Walmisley by three services including the little-known one in eight parts. Coming nearer to our own times, we include the names of Stanford (all five services), Wood (six services), Harwood, Bairstow, Walford Davies and Bullock. Of the moderns, Howells is represented by his Collegium Regale service and several anthems. Others represented are Vaughan Williams, Holst, Joubert and Anthony Hopkins, the last by his motet Carrillon which was sung at the last Carol Service. (No relation, I think, to John!)

It may be added that some works of former organists are included, namely, Ralph Banks, Luard-Selby, Hylton Stewart and Percy Whitlock. Also that, though it is fitting that the bulk of the repertory be taken from English Cathedral music, Continental music is included wherever it can be suitably employed. In this category, we include the names of Palestrine, Vittori, di Lasso, Handl, Sweenlinck, Bach, Handel and Schutz.

Summing up, it might be interesting to note that the repertory now includes a little under 200 anthems and a little under 100 service settings, all of which are sung at least once a year.

Finally, reference must be made to the completion of the Cathedral organ, which was made possible by the generosity of the Friends. A full account of this instrument and its history appeared in the January issue of *The Organ* (Musical Opinion).
