PARTICULARS OF MEMBERSHIP

THE Association of the Friends of Rochester Cathedral was formed in 1935, as it was felt that there were many who would like to be associated with this ancient and interesting church and to have a share in the preservation and upkeep of the fabric.

The Diocese and Cathedral of Rochester go back to the beginning of English Christianity. This is not to be confused with Christianity in what we now speak of as England, for Christianity flourished in Kent soon after the year A.D. 200, and although there is no proof of a Christian Church in Rochester in those early days, there is at least a likelihood that there was one. The Mission sent by Pope Gregory the Great, and welcomed and aided by King Ethelbert, secured the founding of the See of Canterbury about A.D. 597, and those of Rochester and London in A.D. 604. Close to the West Door of the Cathedral the foundations of the apse of the old Saxon Church were discovered—semicircular lines just inside the Cathedral mark the site—and the foundations of its Nave walls were traced running westwards across the cemetery outside. No foundations of a western apse have been discovered. The Cathedral Church as it stands to-day is an interesting epitome of English architecture from early Norman to the present century—the latter represented by restoration work.

All who care for this venerable church are therefore asked to join the Association of Friends of Rochester

Cathedral, and thus to help the Dean and Chapter to bear the responsibility of preserving for future generations a building which stands for so much in the history of our National Church.

Since the inauguration over 1,900 Friends have enrolled themselves, and their contributions have resulted in much valuable work in several ways. Important and necessary repairs to the fabric have been carried out, especially to parapets, roofs, and copings. During the war, funds were supplied by the Friends for defence work against bomb damage, blast, and fire. But it is especially due to their efforts that there has been revealed the interest and beauty of the Monastic Cloisters, its buildings, and its garth. The Chapter House doorway has been opened and the exquisite Romanesque carving of its masonry shown. Within the Chapter House, Priors' burial places have been discovered; the foundations of the pillars which carried a gallery across the west end from the dormitory to the Cathedral have been exposed; the refectory doorway and its adjacent washing-trough have been made objects of interest; and the fine vaulted archway entered from the main road of the Precinct has been opened out. Of the Cellarer's buildings some walls have been shown, and the Tudor buttresses clearly tell what King Henry the Eighth planned for the housing of his retinue. Funds are urgently needed for all this work. Will you become a Friend and help?

The minimum subscription has been fixed at 5s. per annum, which it is hoped will enable all who wish to do so to enrol themselves, but it is also hoped that many will be able to give larger sums. There is also a Corporate Membership for Schools, Colleges, Parochial Church Councils, etc., with a minimum subscription of 10s. per annum, whilst Individual Life Membership is £10, or Joint Life Membership, for husband and wife, £15 15s. Boys and girls under 18 years of age, 2s. per annum. Each Friend receives a Card of Membership

and a copy of the Annual Report is sent to each Member other than Junior Members, when published. A form of application will be found at the end of this Report and should be sent to the Honorary Secretary, The Deanery, Rochester.

Friends who visit the Cathedral and attend Festivals are asked to wear the Badge of Membership, illustrated on the cover. It consists of a gold scallop on a red field with the words "Friends of Rochester Cathedral" round the rim and the date of the inception. Badges are 2s. od. (1s. 6d. for Junior Members) and may be obtained from the Honorary Secretary.

THE ANNUAL REPORT

This year, for reasons which seemed good to the Council, it was considered advisable to revert to our more usual custom of holding the Festival in the middle of June. The Programme of the Festival Day, Saturday, June 15th, will be found on page 16.

It is with the very greatest pleasure that we look forward to welcoming our Royal Patron, *HER ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUCHESS OF KENT* at this year's Festival. Her last visit to the Cathedral was for the purpose of presenting, on behalf of the Association of Men of Kent and Kentish Men, the Ship's Bell of H.M.S. Kent. This year we shall be able to show Her Royal Highness the improvements and some of the repairs and alterations which have been carried through as a result of the Cathedral Appeal. It will be remembered that the Duchess herself headed the list of subscribers.

The past year has been eventful and interesting and, needless to say, the outstanding event was *THE VISIT OF HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN* on October 24th. The visit was necessarily brief as the main purpose of Her Majesty's presence in the Medway Towns was a visit to the Corps of Royal Engineers as their Colonel-in-Chief. Owing to the work on the renovation of the organ the eastern arm of the Cathedral was mainly under scaffolding and Her Majesty's tour had to be confined to the Nave, the Lady Chapel and the Crypt. Her Majesty was much interested in our famous treasure, the *Textus Roffensis*, and in the Lady Chapel she was shown a photographic exhibition illustrative of the church extension plans for the Diocese. Our Vice-President, The Lord Cornwallis, The Lord Lieutenant of Kent, was in attendance on Her Majesty and His Worship The Mayor, together with his Town Clerk, accompanied the Queen from the Guildhall to the Cathedral.

The Cathedral Chapter

Canon D. R. Vicary, appointed by the Lord Chancellor to a Residentiary Canonry of Rochester Cathedral five years ago has now left the Administrative Chapter on his appointment as Headmaster of the King's School, and we shall greatly miss his enthusiastic co-operation and readiness to help in everything concerning the Cathedral Church. Fortunately in moving to his new appointment as Headmaster of the Cathedral School he will still be our near neighbour and a Member of the Greater Chapter. We wish Canon and Mrs. Vicary much happiness in the new responsibilities to which they have now been called.

To the vacant Canonry the Lord Chancellor has appointed the Right Reverend H. C. Read on his retirement from the Bishopric of Nasik in India. We look forward to welcoming him and I hope to instal him in his Canonry at Evensong on Monday, July 1st. I have ventured to include in this Report a photograph of the Dean and Chapter. It represents the personnel of the Chapter over the past five years and it was taken on Canon Vicary's last day as a Residentiary Canon.

The Council

Due to an oversight the triennial election of the Council was unfortunately omitted at last year's Annual General Meeting. I must put this matter right at this year's meeting; I am glad to say that the present Members of the Council have kindly agreed to offer themselves for re-election, with the exception of Mr. King who owing to poor health feels unable to remain a member. We are very grateful to them for their services during the past four years and I shall, with every confidence, put their names forward at the Meeting.

JOHN ARTHUR PRING

d. February 24th, 1957

On Sunday, February 24th, in Maidstone Hospital, John Arthur Pring passed to his rest. For the past four

years he had, with unflinching courage and equally unflinching cheerfulness, struggled against increasing ill-health. Blessed with a gift for friendliness he had to the very end a pleasant smile and a kindly word for all with whom he came in contact. A lover of the Cathedral music he was seldom absent from the daily Evensong and, until illness overtook him was a member of the voluntary choir. Above all he had an unlimited enthusiasm for the work of our Association and maintained personal and friendly relations with many of our Members. For the life and service of this devoted friend and servant of the Cathedral we thank God, and to his married daughter and his three sons we offer our sympathy in their sorrow. Mrs. Pring died eighteen months ago.

The King's School

The end of the Lent Term marked the closing of a chapter in the long history of our ancient Cathedral School when the Reverend E. W. Davies, after twenty-two years as Headmaster, retired on his appointment by the Provost and Fellows of Eton College to the Benefice of Piddlehinton in the County of Dorset. Mr. Davies has been an outstanding personality and a most successful headmaster. He has accomplished a great development in the numbers and equipment of the school and it was with the deep respect and affection of the Governors, the Staff, and the Boys that he and Mrs. Davies left these surroundings which they knew so well for their life in a Dorset village. We thank Mr. and Mrs. Davies for all they have done for the School and we wish them and their family God-speed.

The Cathedral Appeal

Except for a greatly appreciated gift of £1,000 from the Church Commissioners and a legacy of a similar amount under the Will of the late Miss E. F. Chavasse, the Appeal has made but slow progress towards the outstanding sum still required. We are grateful for special efforts by Miss A. Shinkwin (the opening of her

most interesting house, the Old Hall, to visitors); to Miss Mary White (a Sale and Exhibition of her paintings); to Mrs. Tait for the proceeds of a very successful Sale of Work, and to Miss Snowdon-Smith both for the part proceeds of a Sale of Work and the very considerable sum accruing from her Collecting Boxes, now amounting to more than £300. For further gifts and subscriptions we should indeed be grateful.

Cathedral Restoration

The notable achievements since my last Report are the completion of the lighting of the Cathedral by electricity, the reconstruction of the organ, and the lime-washing of the vaulting of the Quire. The lighting of the Nave by means of pendants may not appeal to everyone at first sight, but I remain confident that it will give pleasure to most people who observe it without bias. It is recognised that electric light is harsh when concentrated, with the result that most churches have not been improved by its introduction in place of candles and lamps. The method adopted by our Cathedral Architect, Mr. W. E. Godfrey, of pendant fittings consisting of many lamps of low wattage, was selected as one which would both give light where it was wanted and present something of the quality of the candle-light of the past. The design of the chandeliers was chosen as something which would be a beautiful thing in itself but would not be so heavy as to hide the architecture around it. The pendants seem to fulfil both these functions and it may be added that very seldom have worthwhile fittings or furniture been a detraction from the beauty of a church.

The rebuilding of the organ, referred to in last year's Report, has been successfully carried through by Messrs. Walkers in six months, and the greatly improved instrument was brought into use for the first time on Easter Day. In addition to the replacement of all obsolete parts there is now a new consol with electromagnetic action, the choir organ has been enclosed and

new octave ranges have been provided to some existing stops. The casing and pipes have been carefully cleaned.

The lime-washing of the vaulting of the Quire and its Transepts has been skilfully and carefully carried out, it has done much to brighten and add interest to this part of the Cathedral, and as the Members know, it is proposed that the cost, approximately £1,000, shall be borne by the Association. For this most generous help to the work of restoration the Dean and Chapter are extremely grateful.

All these important alterations and improvements which have been in progress for many months were completed in time for the Easter Day Services to be held in the Quire. I should add that this date could not have been achieved but for the devoted efforts of the Head Verger and his colleagues. After lying for many months under ever increasing layers of dust and debris the work of cleaning and polishing the floors and furniture of the Quire was a tremendous undertaking, as also was the task which confronted Mrs. and Miss Sybil Neech in restoring to brightness the principal brass fittings.

Turning to *The Affairs of the Association* I have earlier in this Report expressed our thanks to the Members of the Council, and certainly I must not forget the services of the Executive Committee who, being local, are liable to be worried at short notice. The taking up of the work of Captain Pring presented a perplexing problem but Mr. H. G. Cooper, a Steward of the Cathedral and Member of the Association, has been good enough to undertake the duties of the Treasurer-ship for the time being. It must have been far from easy for Mr. Cooper to come, almost unprepared, into the office and take over this work, but I can assure our Members that he is carrying it out most efficiently and that we have cause to be most grateful to him.

This Report must be circulated to our Members earlier than was necessary during the past two or three years, but none the less our Acting Treasurer has

contrived to get the Accounts audited in time for inclusion in the Report, and I know he would wish me to express our gratitude to Mr. H. J. Hoby of Messrs. Tribe, Clarke, Darton and Pollock.

Of the work of our Honorary Secretaries, the Reverend R. Johnstone, and his Assistant, Miss B. Neech, I must express our very real appreciation.

There have again been a large number of official and Diocesan Special Services in the course of the year, including the Service in commemoration of the Centenary of the Missions to Seamen, the County Service of the British Red Cross Society, a Service for Members of the Rotary Clubs of Kent and parts of Sussex, the Annual Memorial Service of the Corps of Royal Engineers, the Annual Service of the Royal Artillery Association, the Society of the Servants of the Sanctuary, and many others. Of the Diocesan Services certainly the most important and outstanding was the Sursum Corda Service at the beginning of December, in thanksgiving for the success and progress of the Bishop's "Church Extension" Appeal. This thanksgiving must have provided a real inspiration to the hundreds of representatives of the Diocese who were present.

At the moment of writing we are getting ready for the Broadcasting by the B.B.C. of the Sunday morning Service on April 28th when Canon Vicary will preach the sermon.

Finally, I have to express our gratitude for *Gifts to the Cathedral during the past year*, among them two most useful kneeling desks, the gift of Mrs. White and her daughters in memory of Doctor Clement White. We have to thank Mr. Stephenson, the Head Verger, for the gift of an excellent robing table for use in the Canons' Vestry. We thank Mrs. Tait for the furnishings of the Altar in the Crypt Chapel, and the Members of the Ladies' Guild and Miss J. M. Bowyer (a member of our Association) for providing the covering of the Holy Table in the North Aisle of the Crypt.

In conclusion, as your Chairman, I must thank you

all for your continued interest and support and, just one other thing, it would be wonderful if each member could enlist a new member.

THE LADIES' GUILD

The necessary material was purchased out of our own funds which consist of a small annual subscription by each member and occasional donations. Later, if funds permit, we hope to make some hassocks and perhaps a carpet. Nevertheless, we shall certainly not overlook our routine work which the Members of the Guild carry out most conscientiously.

Once again we have to thank the cleaners of brass as, owing to the repair work in the Quire and the impossibility of any cleaning while the repairs were in progress, the brass was necessarily in a bad state and a vast amount of elbow-grease was essential.

The selling of post cards on Saturdays and Bank Holidays proved to be most useful and successful and we have been asked to undertake it again this summer.

ACTING HON. TREASURER'S REPORT

THE accounts of the Association have been audited on behalf of Messrs. Tribe, Clarke, Darton & Pollock by Mr. H. J. Hoby, A.C.A., who is himself a member of the Association. We are grateful to him for again performing this service in an honorary capacity.

I should like to express my thanks to members for the promptitude with which they remit their subscriptions and to those who add some small addition as a "donation", the amount of such donations during the year was over £17.

Proceeds from the sale of postcards amounted to £42, an increase of £10 over the previous year. This is no doubt due to the Ladies' Guild some of whose members were "on duty" at the bookstall on Saturdays during the summer.

The total income from all sources was £745, £18 less than the previous year although subscriptions from "ordinary" members were up by about £19. A less number of Life Members was enrolled.

Total expenditure amounted to £424, rather more than last year, but this included a bill for £54 for building a wall and coping in the Cloister Garth near Bishops Gate and the figure is included in "Upkeep of Cloister Garth". In addition, £400 has been donated to the Dean and Chapter as a first instalment towards the cost of renovating the Choir vaulting.
